In the modified open trucks, two started and Dan Fresh (#740) was the only finisher in a Jeep Comanche. None of the three McNeil trucks in Classes "7" or in "75X" (Perry, Jr.) finished. Very unusual! No Baja race is a race without a McNeil in the winner's circle.

Eric Fisher and Isaac Chapluk – "Bronco's Steak House" never faltered as they swing-axled Garibay Challenger #900's way to the win before noon, Saturday. Archrival Arturo Velasco was two-and-a-half hours back. The other two cars were DNFs.

In other classes Chad Hall and Josh Hall teamed to win Stock Full in a Hummer, finishing ahead of Marc Stein and Mike McComas in a Ford Expedition. Rod Hall and Mike Winkel ran third, and Noah and Matt Pike were fourth and the final finishers in another Expedition. The Sporty Truck ranks had only one finisher out of four: "Dour" Doug Granger and Richard Czerlau, #1501, from Dorchester, Ontario, Canada, ay? In Class 3 the Moss Brothers in their later-model Bronco kept moving and took the win over the Beals – a "1000" surprise, I would offer. They have a good finishing record: not fast, certainly not smooth, but there.

There were two starters in the Stock Mini division and neither truck finisher. Class 11 had four starters and none of the beetles finished.

suppose to, thought he might have broke an ear drum, sent to hospital in ambulance just for precaution.

Bekki reported: "Adam is doing great. He was in BJ Baldwin Trophy-Truck #97 going over Zoo Road when a Mexican spectator threw a rock in the front window and clobbered Adam in the chin/neck area. The impact pushed his jawbone into the ear canal, causing his ear to fill with blood. We did not know this and that is what scared us so. His chin was cut open from side to side, thirty stitches inside, one continuous outside, and a few under his bottom lip."
